Benefits are many. At the top of the list is our ability to provide reliable service. The popularity of tankless water heaters has risen in recent years.

These units are advertised as being

more efficient than traditional heaters. Since they only heat the water while it is flowing, they are not subject to standby losses typical of traditional tank style water heaters. While the amount of gas consumed in a year's time may be less for a tankless unit, the rate of flow while heating is typically five times higher. This higher flow rate can be difficult to achieve from OPU's 5 PSIG

to low pressure. In the OPU gas distribution system, the equipment that controls this flow is commonly referred

OPU began conversion of the 5PSIG (pounds per square inch gauge) gas distribution system to our standard 50 PSIG system in 2017. We replaced or pressure tested mains and services for 69 homes. We chose a relatively small area to test our process and methodology. The specific area chosen had a high concentration of the oldest meters and regulators in our system. Along with replacing the meter and regulator, the conversion includes installation the new bypass meter bar highlighted in our equipment series article last March. Having achieved good success last year, we increased the size of the project this year to include 259 homes. The project boundaries are shown on the included map. The block of Pearl St. between Cedar Ave. and Elm Ave. was included this year in order to provide service to proposed building construction in that block.

distribution system. To compound this problem, many tankless units require a higher gas inlet pressure than conventional units. Just as water runs downhill, gas flows from high pressure

to as a district regulator station. Within the areas proposed for conversion, OPU operates 7 of these stations. When the conversion is completed these stations will be removed eliminating the maintenance expense.

Completion of the conversion work will increase gas deliverability, reduce maintenance expenses, and simplify system operation.

This month we are focusing on work zone safety. Work zones play a key role in maintaining and upgrading our nation's roadways as well as keeping utility services reliable. In Minnesota, drivers are required to slow down or move over for emergency vehicles parked or working on the side of the road with their emergency lights activated. "Emergency vehicles" brings to mind police cars, fire trucks, ambulances, and tow trucks. What you may not know is this also includes utility company vehicles, freeway service patrol vehicles, road maintenance vehicles or other construction vehicles with warning lights activated.

Work zone incidents impact everyone. Nationally, in the past 5 years, 4,400 people have died in work zone crashes on roads with speed limits greater than 50 mph. 660 of those fatalities were workers.

Worker fatalities in road construction sites is increasing. In 2016, distracted driving in total, not just in work zones, claimed 3,450 lives. Distracted driving first brings to mind texting on your phone. However, it also includes talking on your phone, eating or drinking, talking to other people in your vehicle, or fiddling with the radio, entertainment or navigation system. It is anything that takes your attention away from the task of safe driving.

Our utility workers may be your friend or family member so we're certain you want them to come home safely each and every evening. We do too! Safety is one of our most important goals at OPU. Each year our workers take work zone safety and coning classes to stay abreast of the most up-to-date requirements. They use proper coning techniques when working in roadways and place a cone behind their work vehicles when parked. The cone serves as a reminder to walk around the vehicle before leaving a work zone to ensure nothing has changed since arriving on site. Our workers also wear

high-visibility vests and clothing to ensure they are seen. Yet, with all the precautions our employees take, they still report near misses from drivers not paying attention in the work zone. We take the safety of our employees very seriously, and ask that you do, too.

So what can you do?

- <u>Expect the Unexpected.</u> Work zones change often.
 The area you drove yesterday may look different today.
- Avoid Distractions. Distracted driving in a work zone can have deadly consequences. Put down your phone and keep your eyes on the road.
- Pay Attention to Other Drivers. Narrowed traffic patterns provide less ability to maneuver around other vehicles safely. Paying attention can prevent the need for evasive actions in work zones.
- <u>Don't speed or tailgate.</u> Keep a safe distance from the vehicle ahead of you and don't speed. Tailgating and speeding lead to crashes with other vehicles and field workers.
- Obey Road Crews and Signs. Flaggers know how best to move traffic safely in work zones. The warning signs are there to help you and other drivers move safely.
- Be Patient and Stay Calm. Work zone crew members are working to improve the road and make your future driving better. Stay calm and drive safely.

Remember: Work zone safety is everybody's responsibility. When you see the orange "Utility Work Ahead" signs, please stay alert, slow down and give our workers a brake!

EQUIPMENT SERIES



VAC-TRON is a brand name commonly used to refer to a larger class of vacuum excavating equipment. OPU owns and operates three vacuum excavating machines. use a high pressure water spray to loosen soil & debris and a powerful vacuum to collect & deposit this "mud" in a tank for later disposal. With a total investment exceeding \$100,000,

these three pieces of equipment don't come cheap, but they safely perform tasks that other methods cannot accomplish.

Our smallest unit is used primarily for cleaning valve boxes. Over the years, winter road sand can enter the box over a water or gas valve and prevent access to the top of the buried valve. OPU routinely operates system valves to insure they will function in an emergency. The middle unit is used to expose phone lines, cable TV lines and electric cables that must be crossed when installing new gas mains and services. Vacuum excavation is recognized within the industry as being the safest method to expose these lines without damaging to them. The largest unit, used primarily by the electric crew, is capable of excavating a hole large enough to replace a power pole. It has the added benefit of longer hoses so that pole replacement on a back lot line can be accomplished without driving the vehicle across the yard.

GET OUTDOORS



Now that Spring/Summer has finally overtaken winter, get outside and enjoy the great outdoors. Go fishing, hiking, flying a kite, or any other activity you enjoy.

Remember, before you cast that fishing line or release that kite, be sure to look up. There may be power lines overhead. Contact with overhead power-lines can be deadly.

CALL BEFORE YOU DIG

Minnesota Law **REQUIRES** homeowners, do-it-yourselfers, excavators and contractors contct Gopher State One Call two business days prior to digging, driving stakes, or performing any other activities that involve disrupting the ground. **Never assume the depth of a utility or that the depth of the utilities are consistent.**

Gopher State One Call will contact the utility companies in the area to have underground lines marked. Once all utility lines are marked, digging may begin. Proceed with caution and avoid the tolerance zone or hand dig with a shovel within 2 feet of the marked utility lines.

Watch for private facilities such as sprinklers, power lines to garages or out buildings, gas grill lines or invisible fencing as these will not be located by Minnesota utility companies.

Storm Drain Marking Program

Participants will check out a Storm Drain Marking Kit with all needed supplies to stencil a "No Dumping Drains to River CleanH2Owatonna" message near the catch basin. The City will also provide a storm system map your area of interest. It is best to participate as a group.

Catch Basin Adoption Program

Participants will select nearby catch basins to adopt. Responsibilities of the adoptee include ensuring the catch basin remains clear of debris, periodic grate cleaning, and stenciling of the catch basin. Participants will receive a complimentary CleanH2Owatonna rake.

Remember: the distance between your yard and the water's edge is as close as the nearest storm drain or ditch.

The City Engineering Department offers several other community programs, including Rain Garden Cost Share.
